

Spiritual ecology is a 40-year old academic field in religious studies recognizing that there is a spiritual facet to all issues related to conservation, environmentalism, and actions that support the flourishing of the planet. This symposium will explore through interfaith dialogue, humanity's underlying attitudes and beliefs that have led to the depletion of species, global warming, and over-consumption. Proponents of Spiritual Ecology assert a need for contemporary conservation work to include spiritual perspectives and for contemporary religion and spirituality to include awareness of and engagement in ecological issues. The evening symposium panel will consist of four speakers who represent Hindu/Vedantic, Islamic and indigenous perspectives on the subject.



SPEAKERS



Paramahansa Prajnanananda is the current spiritual leader of an authentic and unbroken lineage of Kriya Yoga masters represented by Kriya Yoga International Organizations. Today, Paramahansa Prajnanananda is revered as one of the most eminent spiritual personalities of our times. A prolific author, he has written and translated books on spiritual topics, skillfully interpreting ageless philosophies in the light of modern science. His metaphorical explanations of the Holy Scriptures of East and West are unique. The multilingual master is a treasured guest speaker around the world. In 1999, as a speaker at the Parliament of World Religions Conference in Cape Town, South Africa, he gave two powerful plenary talks: "Alleviation of Poverty: A Spiritual Outlook" and "Yoga: The Hope of the Future." Over the years he has been invited to innumerable conferences and events in the USA, India, Europe, Canada, South America, Australia, and New Zealand. His lectures on various themes include excerpts on

love for humanity and world peace. His most recent book, "I Will Collect Flowers for Thee," also addresses the global ecological crisis, and the need for mankind to be more environmentally friendly. Paramahansa Prajnanananda founded Prajnana Mission, which provides health services, secular and spiritual education, and many other charitable activities around the world. One such notable project is *Hariharananda Balashram*, a residential school for underprivileged children in Arua, Odisha, near his own birthplace, Pattamundai, Odisha, India.



Seyyed Hossein Nasr, PhD, is an Iranian professor of Islamic studies at George Washington University, and an Islamic philosopher. After receiving an MIT SB degree in physics in 1954, Nasr obtained a master's degree in geology and geophysics in 1956, and went on to pursue his PhD degree in the history of science and learning at Harvard University. He is the author of scholarly books and articles. Nasr speaks and writes on subjects such as philosophy, religion, spirituality, music, art, architecture, science, literature, civilizational dialogues, and the natural environment. He has also written two books of poetry (*Poems of the Way* and *The Pilgrimage of Life and the Wisdom of Rumi*) and has been described as a "polymath". Nasr is the author of over fifty books and five hundred articles (a of which can be found in the journal, *Studies in Comparative Religion*) on topics such as Traditionalist metaphysics,

Islamic science, religion and the environment, Sufism, and Islamic philosophy. He has written works in Persian, English, French, and Arabic. In year 2000, a volume was devoted to him in the Library of Living Philosophers and in 1999 he was the recipient of the Templeton Religion and Science Award.

Melissa K. Nelson, PhD, is an ecologist and native scholar-activist. She is Anishinaabe/Métis/Norwegian and an enrolled member of the Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa Indians. Her work is dedicated to indigenous rights and revitalization, Native biocultural diversity, ecological ethics and sustainability, and the renewal and celebration of community health and cultural arts. Dr. Nelson is a professor of Indigenous Sustainability, at Arizona State University and president of the Cultural Conservancy, an indigenous rights organization. Dr. Nelson received her Ph.D. from the University of California, Davis in Ecology with an emphasis in Eco philosophy and Native American Environmental Studies. Her first edited anthology *Original Instructions – Indigenous Teachings for a Sustainable Future* (2008), focuses on the persistence of Traditional Ecological Knowledge by contemporary native communities. In 2005, Dr. Nelson was the co-producer of the award-winning documentary film, *The Salt Song Trail: Bringing Creation Back Together* and has co-produced several other documentary short films. Dr. Nelson is a Switzer Fellow (1996) and Environmental Leadership Award recipient and has received awards for teaching, experiential education, documentary filmmaking, and environmental stewardship.
